
Neville Chamberlain 1938 on his return from meeting Hitler in Munich

- In the summer of 1938 my Grandma was nearly 4 and living in London
- My great- grandfather did not believe Chamberlain and thought war was on its way
- He moved his family from London to a small village called Goadby Marwood in Leicestershire
- By Oct 1938 my family were living in a rented farmhouse called the 'The Laurels'

The Laurels was a busy house during the war Not only my Grandma and Great Grandparents but also:

- Other family members coming and going from other cities
- An Evacuee child called Pat
- And four families from the Belgian Government (Civil Servants) when their Government was in exile
- Dogs, puppies, goats, pigs and hens.....
- My Great Grandma got very creative, having to feed so many people on food rations.




Grandma, her parents with Mr Boone and Madame Guysbreck from Belgium

At the other end of the village The Manor House



- During the war this house was rented by the British Government
- First of all it was used to imprison <u>Conscientious Objectors</u>
- Then <u>Italian Prisoners</u> of War, until 1943 when the Italians switched sides
- And finally, <u>German Prisoners</u> of War

- The prisoners all lived in the stables and out buildings, whilst eating and washing in the specially converted rooms in the house
- During the war they all worked on the land to help keep Britain fed.
