





69 years later, to celebrate the Queen's 70th year on the throne, villagers once again gathered lives of those pictured. together around the Vil-





Churchyard Survey

One of our main focuses during 2022 was to record all the memorials in St. Denys' Church and Churchyard.

Many Saturday mornings were spent kneeling in the damp grass trying to transcribe the worn and weathered words on each gravestone.

The beautiful memorial pictured marks the grave of Algernon Turnor, the young son of Algernon and Henrietta Turnor who lived at Goadby Hall towards the end of the 19th Century.

According to newspaper reports of the time, young Algernon died after eating poisonous berries which he had picked whilst out woods around the estate.



The Goadby Marwood Belvoir Angel

During our survey of the gravestones we were delighted to discover a single 'Belvoir Angel'.

Found in Melton and throughout the Vale of Belvoir, Belvoir Angels are a distinctive example of localised folk art that appeared on gravestones in the Vale from around 1690 until 1750. In each case the grave shows a carved angel with down-turned wings and a ruffed neck. It is thought they were commissioned by wealthy parishioners wanting to leave their mark on Earth. The identity of the masons remains a mystery although some historians believe they may have been a father and son, possibly
