Glebe Terrier 1708 transcription

A true Terrar of the Parsonage House Glebe Lands and all the rights of the Church belonging to the Rectory of Goadby Marwood

Impr. The parsonage house containing four bays of ----

Building is built with stone & consists of a kitchen paved with broad stone, two parlours boarded & a passage made use of for a Hall floored with broad stone all (this) below stairs. Above stairs there are as follows - a room over the kitchen floored with plaster, a room over the great parlour boarded, a room over the little parlour boarded, over these three last mentioned rooms are two garrets & a study all floored with plaster & the kitchen & the room over it is covered with thatch. All the roof of the house is covered with thatch and with slate. The outhouses contain four bays & are a Branhouse & a Coal house, a stable & a Barn all built with stone & covered with thatch. The Homestead consisting of a garden & a yard containing about three rood stoned with dry stone walling round about ...the garden being situate on the East side of the house & the yard on the West.

- 2 The Glebe Land (viz) one Close called the Lees containing three acre Clay Field on the South James Toon on the East the Lane on the west, also three other Closes lying all together containing by computation thirty four acres bounded by Wicombe Field on the South Windmill Field on the East Crane Sick on the West Gamble Field on the North.
- 3 The tithes are at present paid by a composition that never was decreed in Chancery nor any other ways ratified but the Rector must make his bargain as well as he can whilst the owners continue grazing their Land, but when they plough Tithes are to be paid in kind.
- 4 Surplus fees according to immemorial (as it is (?)) as follows ... Easter Offerings are sixpence for every household, Churchings seven pence, Marriages two shillings sixpence, Burials nothing Mortuaries were never paid as it is said.
- 5 The Rector pays for Tenths one pound & two shillings to the Archdeacon, for Procurations & Synodals eleven shillings yearly.
- 6 Furniture for the Church are a Surplice, a Velvet Cushion for the Pulpit, a green table Cloth for the Communion Table, a Pewter Tankard, a Silver Cup with Lidd weighing with the lidd eight ounces, three Rolls, a Chest with three locks, & a book of Articles, a Bible, a Book of Common Prayer, & a Book of Homilies, & a Biere for the Dead.
- 7 The Town in general is charged with the repair of the edifices & the churchyard fence.
- 8 The Clerk's wages are paid by the whole Town & are customarily nine shillings a year.
